Patchogue Village's very own James Skidmore, president of the Greater Patchogue Chamber of Commerce and general manager of Toast Coffeehouse, has been invited to attend the international Oslo Freedom Forum.

This year's forum will be held in Oslo, Norway from May 28-30 and will mark the 10th anniversary of the unique gathering of the world's "bravest" human rights activists including entrepreneurs, reporters, technologists and artists.

"It's movers and shakers and influencers trying to yield justice on a global level all coordinated by the Human Rights Organization," Skidmore explained. "These people are really working hard to take down tyranny wherever it exists. They want to bring basic human rights globally."

After attending a satellite event in New York City last year, Skidmore said he was intrigued and bit by the international activist bug. Soon, he received an email prompted by a few questions about the event. After later attending another event involving a more grassroots organization, the Bioneers Conference, he decided to reply, suggesting the two join forces, thinking not much of it. But, not even two days later, he received a call from an Oslo Freedom Forum representative planning to include the Bioneers organization next year, thanking him for the connection and inviting him to the forum in Norway. Skidmore immediately jumped on board and decided to pack his bags and garner some community support to attend the forum, representing the chamber and village.

But the invitation comes with a price — about \$4,000, to be exact. Though Skidmore said he plans to attend despite any potential donations, he hopes he can defer some of the burdening costs.

"Come hell or high water, I am going," he said, excited about attending the forum. "But I am hoping to have some of it subsidized or else I will be paying it off for years."

The Greater Patchogue Chamber of Commerce has also decided to allow any tax-deductible donations to help support Skidmore's trip be made through the notfor-profit arm, the Greater Patchogue Foundation.

"This is very exciting for James and the chamber," said chamber executive director David Kennedy. "It will be an international connection to our local foundation. It's wonderful exposure."

"I am going to come back to Patchogue inspired with a lot of great things to talk about and continuing my dream of stepping into the global community," Skidmore added. ■
